# 21-member Opp team to visit Manipur

## To leave for violence-hit state today, plan to meet Gov Uikey tomorrow

AHEAD OF the much-awaited discussion in the Lok Sabha on a no-confidence motion moved by the Opposition INDIA alliance against the Government, a 21-member multi-party delegation of MPs will visit the violence-hit regions of Manipur and the relief camps on Saturday and Sunday.

The delegations will have MPs from 16 parties. Ahead of their visit, Congress deputy leader in Lok Sabha Gaurav Gogoi, a member of the delegation, demanded an inquiry under a retired Supreme Court judge into the violence that had rocked Manipur.

The visit is aimed at mounting pressure on the Government, which had been stonewalling Opposition demands for a suo motu statement by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on the Manipur situation.

The Opposition wanted to get a first hand account of the situation in Manipur, interacting with those affected and visiting the areas that were hit by the bloody ethnic violence before the discussion.

The delegation would visit the affected areas and people both in the valley and the hills. It would also visit two relief camps in both the places and assess the situation themselves, Congress MP and the party's whip in Rajya Sabha Naseer Hussain said.

Sources said the Opposition bloc had written to Manipur Chief Minister N Biren Singh, who allowed the delegation to visit the state. The delegation would be meeting Manipur Governor Anusuiya Uikey on

Sunday morning, Hussain said. He said MPs have sought to use helicopters there and if allowed, they will be able to visit the far-flung areas of Churachandpur, where fresh violence has taken place.

"We have got permission from the state government to visit the affected areas and also the relief camps. We have also got permission to meet the Governor, who has allowed time to the delegation on Sunday," Hussain told reporters.

The delegation will include Congress leader in Lok Sabha Adhir Ranjan Chowdhury and his party colleagues Gogoi, Kodikunni Suresh and Phulo Devi Netam besides TMC's Sushmita Dev, JMM's Mahua Majhi, DMK's Kanimozhi, NCP's Mohammad Faizal, Jayant Chaudhary of RLD, Manoj Kumar Jha of RJD, N K Premachandran of RSP and T Thirumavalavan of the VCK.

The other members of the delegation are JD(U) chief Rajiv Ranjan (Lalan) Singh and his party colleague Aneel Prasad Hegde, CPI's Sandosh Kumar, CP(M)'s A A Rahim, Samajwadi Party's Javed Ali Khan, IUML's E T Mohammed Basheer, AAP's Sushil Gupta, Arvind Sawant (Shiv Sena-Uddhav Thackeray), D Ravikumar (DMK).

Dev said the Opposition delegation wants to give the message that "we are with the people of Manipur".

"We are concerned, we want peace to return... the government has failed, so we want to go there and see what solution can be found," she said.

DMK leader T R Baalu said the Opposition delegation will be leaving for Manipur Saturday morning and will find out what went wrong, the extent of damage and loss of lives and property.

# 4 years later, EC yet to give details of any discrepancy between EVM, VVPAT count

FOUR YEARS after the government told Parliament that it would collect information from the Election Commission about possible discrepancies between the Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) and Voter Verifiable Paper Audit Trail (VVPAT) tallies during the 2019 elections, a Parliamentary panel this week noted that the reply was yet to be provided, adding that identifying such issues was necessary for the security of the voting process. In its report on the pending assurances pertaining to the Law and Justice Ministry, which was presented in the Lok Sabha on Thursday, the Committee on Government Assurances said an unstarred

question regarding "discrepancy in EVM and VVPAT" was asked on June 26, 2019. The government was asked whether any discrepancy between the EVM and VVPAT counts was found in the 2019 Lok Sabha elections and if so, what corrective measures had been taken. In the reply, the government gave an assurance that the information was being collected and would be laid on the table of the House. The Law Ministry informed the committee, which is chaired by BJP MP from Meerut Rajendra Agrawal, that it had asked the EC for the required information on March 12, 2020 and sent reminders on September 3, 2020, February 19, 2021, October 7, 2021, November 26, 2021 and June 3, 2022. "The requisite information from the EC is still awaited," the ministry said. Giving oral evidence

in January this year, the Legislative Department Secretary said the EC had been called, but they could not attend as they were "having discussions with some political parties". The committee then gave the ministry a month's extension to fulfil the assurance. "The Committee note that finding discrepancies between EVMs and VVPAT is crucial aspect of ensuring the integrity and transparency of the electoral process. The Committee feel that need for identifying such issues is all the more necessary to ensure security and reliability of the voting process. EVMs and VVPATs are designed to provide an accurate reflection of voter's choice... The Committee however, regret to note that precious little has been done in this direction..." the report said.

# No woman have yet qualified to join the military's special forces, says govt

NO WOMAN in the Indian Armed Forces has yet been able to qualify for induction into its elite special forces, despite a few of them volunteering to join the units, the government told Parliament on Friday.

"Women Officers in the Indian Armed Forces are eligible to volunteer for induction. Into the special forces without any gender bias, provided they meet selection Qualitative Requirements (QRs), and successfully complete the training," Minister of State in the Defence Ministry Ajay Bhatt told the Lok Sabha in a written reply.

Bhatt said that in the Indian Air Force, a total of two women officers have volunteered till date for special forces training and were detailed to undergo the same, but could not pass the training.

"In the Indian Navy, 20 women Agniveers (sailors) had appeared for the aptitude test for induction into special forces. However, none of them qualified," he added.

The Para-Special Forces of the Army, the Marine Commandos of the Navy and the Garud Commandos of the IAF undergo months of gruelling probation and need to maintain extremely high standards of physical and mental fitness before they qualify to become a member of a special

forces unit.

Once qualified, they undergo specialised training for the specialised task a unit is mandated to perform. For example, the Army has special forces units—each specialising in deserts, jungles, mountains and counter-terrorism roles.

The special forces of the three services train to carry out strikes behind enemy lines, covert inductions, anti-terror operations and highly specialised tactical military tasks including intelligence gathering and laser designation.

Women, however, do serve in parachute units in the Army, but not in the special forces units.

The three services have over the years opened several of its arms for women and recently as Agniveers.

The Army, being the largest of the three services, has the largest number of women officers at 1,705, followed by 1,640 women officers in the IAF, and 559 in the Navy. This data was submitted by the government to Parliament last year.

# Chairman adjourns RS after spat with Derek

THE PROCEEDINGS of the Rajya Sabha were adjourned for the day on Friday after Chairman Jagdeep Dhankhar's spat with TMC leader Derek O'Brien.

O'Brien interrupted Dhankhar on the issue of non-admission of notices given by Opposition members under Rule 267 to hold a discussion on the situation in Manipur, following which the chairman adjourned proceedings of the House.

He said he had agreed to hold a short-duration discussion on the issue and asked members to discuss the issue under that rule. He was talking about how the behaviour of Rajya Sabha MPs is viewed by the outside world, when O'Brien interjected him and thumped the desk to highlight the motion that Opposition parties have been trying to move since the Monsoon session began last week.

Calling this "theatrics", Dhankhar said, "Show respect to the chair". "Don't thump the desk," he said. While O'Brien continued his statement, Dhankhar adjourned the proceedings for the day.

# The Manipur question should bother the govt; state needs to be seen, heard

## For decades, the Northeast was synonymous with insurgencies. It is only in recent years that relative political stability came to the region



Weekly insight into what's changing in national politics—and why

THE SINGLE-JUDGE verdict which sparked off the protests that led to violence in Manipur is a reminder how big doors often swing on little hinges.

There have been court verdicts in the past that have unleashed political maelstroms in the country. The Allahabad High Court's judgment on June 12, 1975, which disqualified the then prime minister Indira Gandhi from Parliament for electoral malpractices and led her to impose the 19-month Emergency, culminated in her defeat in 1977, bringing to power a united opposition Janata government.

In April 1985 came the initially innocuous Shah Bano verdict. The court gave relief of a paltry sum of Rs 25 a month to a 62-year-old Muslim woman, divorced after 45 years of marriage by her husband by pronouncing talaq.

The protests among the Muslim community led then PM Rajiv Gandhi to go in for a law to undo the judgment, and then, to placate the Hindu community over this, to open the locks enabling worship at the disputed Babri Masjid site.

This changed the trajectory of Indian politics over the 30 years that followed, leading to the rise and rise of the BJP.

The court directive that was the immediate trigger for the Manipur violence asked the state government to consider giving Scheduled Tribe status to the Meitei community in the state. The Kuki tribal community protested, and the clashes between them since have left around 150 people dead, several houses burnt, with the state and Central governments unable to bring the situation under control even three months later.

A video of Kuki tribal women paraded naked and sexually assaulted is something the country will take a long time to live down. The judgment is now on hold, while the government said on Thursday that it has decided to hand over the probe into the case to the CBI, and to hold the trial

outside Manipur. Both these steps, read between the lines, betray a lack of confidence by the Modi government in the state administration run by its own BJP in Manipur. And yet the Centre has fought shy of sacking Chief Minister N Biren Singh, as demanded by many so as to ensure accountability, particularly after he tried to justify the delay in taking action by saying that "over 6,000 FIRs" had been filed across the state.

Many feel the conflagration could have been defused had the Centre sent him packing, or resorted to President's rule, though Article 356 is a double-edged sword. Once you go down that route, there is no end to its use in other states—as seen in the past. The trouble is that Biren Singh has become a hero to his Meitei community, and the situation, by design or by default, is sharply polarised along Meitei-Kuki lines today, and could benefit the BJP politically in Manipur, with its ripple effects felt in other states like Assam and Tripura, where faultlines exist. (The three states account for 18 out of 25 Lok Sabha seats in the Northeast.)

It has mystified many as to why Prime Minister Narendra Modi chose to keep him on Manipur for nearly three months, till the video of the sexual assault emerged. One of the main lines of attack by the BJP against this predecessor, Manmohan Singh, was that he kept "mum" as Sonia Gandhi led the show. A few sentences by Modi, even a brief appeal for peace, might have brought down the temperatures in Manipur, his critics say.

The newly formed 26-party Opposition alliance I.N.D.I.A has made his silence a political stick to beat him with, not allowing Parliament to function till he speaks on the floor of the House.

Those close to the establishment forward several explanations for the PM's silence, including that he does not act under pressure of the Opposition as that would make him come across as a weak leader.

The more cynical among them say that at the end of the day, as unfortunate as the Manipur situation may be, it is not likely to resonate in heartland India, and that the ruling party hopes to ride the storm.

However, what will worry the ruling dispensation is the continuation of the

conflict even when G20 Summit comes around in September in Delhi. The European Parliament earlier called the violence in Manipur "unacceptable".

The Opposition's notice for a no-confidence motion against the Modi government—it has been accepted by the Lok Sabha Speaker, though a date for it yet to be fixed—is essentially to compel the PM to speak in the House. Given the way the numbers are stacked in the Lok Sabha, there is no way the government is going to be defeated.

The more important issue at hand, however, is how to bring normalcy to Manipur, where faultlines have been deepened. And to impart a sense of reassurance to the Northeast. Given the long, unchecked spell of violence, many have begun to ask the question of whether the rest of India has abandoned them. As it is, tensions are spreading outwards, towards neighbouring states.

For decades, the Northeast was synonymous with insurgencies. It is only in recent years that relative political stability came to the region. Bordered by China, Myanmar, Bangladesh and Bhutan, and seen as a gateway to Southeast Asia, the region's import for India's national security cannot be emphasised enough.

Clearly, there is a need to strike a new note to bring sanity back to Manipur, and bring the state back from the brink. Ultimately, it is political activity that restores normalcy in any conflict situation. But the elected MLAs of the state have become virtually invisible. A delegation of Opposition parties is now all set to go to Imphal to speak to both sides.

If only it had been an all-party delegation from Delhi headed to Imphal. If nothing else, it might have signalled that the rest of India does care. In the end, the way forward has to happen on the ground in Manipur, by politicians and stakeholders who have stakes in the state's future and are aware of the sensitivities of its past. That needs good politics and good governance, not just officers from New Delhi being parachuted to Imphal.
